 to an insurer or in part of--support of a claim for payment or other insurance benefit, and/or knowingly and willfully urged Jamie Bell, another person, to violate this act by making a false statement knowing that it contained false information concerning a fact material to insurance claim, and did so intending to injure, defraud, or deceive.

In this case, this is a preliminary examination. The standard is probable cause. There's evidence that was presented through the tape, Exhibit Number 4. "testimony that he was told to not say he was the driver for insurance and license reasons. It testified that he was asked to change the report by Michael Terpening several times for insurance purposes. We heard the tape, Jamie Bell calls in and says her boss asked her to call in and make the claim. I believe that there is probable cause to show that this offense has occurred, your Honor.

THE COURT: Mr. Eldred?

MR. ELDRED: Your Honor, I would disagree with the Prosecution--Prosecution's summation. I don't believe they've shown that Mr. Terpening has done any acts that would meet this--these requirements of this statute. He has not made any reports, there's no evidence he's made any reports to the police; that he made any reports to the

insurance company; that he even had any-there's not even credible evidence that he had any information that Jamie Bell was not driving the vehicle that day. There's no indication that Mr. Terpening has done anything to gain-fraudulently to gain in this matter.

Your Honor, the evidence is that that on that night Mr. Terpening wasn't present; that Jamie Bell apparently indicated that she was driving; that he was not present, had no personal knowledge to that effect; that Jamie Bell apparently called the insurance company and made a claim; that Jamie Bell talked to the police and made a report.

Mr. Who we believe to be highly non-credible, even he reports that he had no information about whether Mr. Terpening thought he was incorrect when he asked him to change the report or if he was simply askin' him to change a report because he thought Mr. filled it out incorrectly, that he believed Jamie Bell was driving.

For the--For him to have committed this act he had to intend to benefit from. That he had somehow had knowledge that he was--that Jamie Bell was not driving the vehicle that night. I don't believe that's been proven to this Court that he in some way made contact with the insurance company in an effort to gain from a fraudulent

report. I don't believe that's been shown to this Court.

I just don't believe the Prosecution has met it's minimal burden of probable cause today.

Probable cause is some cause, your Honor. It isn't much, I agree, but it is some cause, and the Prosecution has failed to present to this Court any cause to believe that Mr. Terpening did anything in this matter other than—than have his vehicle driven by Jamie Bell or someone else and having people lie to him about it.

Mr. Terpening made no acts, made no effort to gain from this--this matter, made no reports to the insurance company or to the police. There is no proof presented to this Court, credible proof that he in any way influenced Jamie Bell to do anything in this matter.

Your Honor, the--the Prosecution is asking you to make a leap of--of conclusions in this matter. They played you a tape of Jamie Bell calling the insurance company, and reporting the accident, and makin' a claim, and then ask you to somehow attribute that to Michael Terpening. They present to you an accident report that Jamie Bell made to the police, and somehow ask you to attribute that to Mr. Terpening.

Your Honor, we don't believe that the Prosecution has met it's burden, and, once again, we would ask that these charges be dismissed as they pertain to Mr.

Terpening. Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Eldred. Some of the key facts that—that I heard today, number one that Mr. Terpening gave the keys or the authorization, whether he physically gave the keys or not, gave the authorization to Mr. to drive his truck to take his girlfriend to the dance that evening. There was no testimony or any reason to believe, whatsoever, that Ms. Bell would be driving the vehicle on that particular evening.

There was an accident, he was aware of the accident, made aware of the accident. Testimony is that he told Mr. On at least two occasions to change the incident report to include that Ms. Bell was driving the vehicle, not Mr. And then it was clear from the recording that Miss Bell—at least Miss Bell said in the recording that she was instructed by the Defendant to—to make the call and make the claim to the insurance company.

Again, this is a probable cause hearing, this is not a trial. It's not beyond a reasonable doubt standard, it's probable cause standard. Given those uncontroverted facts, I do find probable cause to-To not find probable cause, you'd have to believe that Miss Bell acted entirely on her own in this matter, and there doesn't seem to be any testimony to that extent, and doesn't really seem to
